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Iniencephaly is a rare type of cephalic disorder characterised by three common characteristics: a defect to the occipital bone, spina bifida of the cervical vertebrae and retroflexion (backward bending) of the head on the cervical spine.

Stillbirth is the most common outcome, with a few rare examples of live birth, after which death almost invariably occurs within a short time.

The disorder was first described by Étienne Geoffroy Saint-Hilaire in 1836. The name is derived from the Ancient Greek word lvíov inion, for the occipital bone/nape of the neck.

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
