Aciclovir (ACV), also known as [acyclovir](#) and acycloguanosine is an antiviral medication.

Aciclovir is a nucleic acid analog made from guanosine. It works by decreasing the making of the virus's DNA.

The discovery of aciclovir was announced in [1977](#).

It is on the World Health Organization's List of Essential Medicines, the most important medications needed in a basic health system.

It is available as a generic medication and is marketed under many brand names worldwide.

Drug info: Acyclovir (Zovirax®) R_x Adult: 30 mg/kg/day, in divided q 8 hr doses in a minimum volume of 100 ml IV fluid over 1 hr (caution: this fluid load may be hazardous, especially since [cerebral edema](#) is already usually problematic) for 14-21 days (some relapses have been reported after only 10 days of treatment).

R_x Children >6 mos age: 500mg/m² IV q 8 hrs×10 days. R_x Neonatal: 10 mg/kg IV q 8 hrs for 10 days.

- optimal treatment: early administration of IV [acyclovir](#) for [herpes simplex encephalitis](#).

Indications

It is primarily used for the treatment of [herpes simplex virus](#) infections, chickenpox, and shingles. Other uses include the prevention of cytomegalovirus infections following transplant and infections due to the Epstein-Barr virus. It is available by mouth and intravenously.

Side effects

Common side effects include nausea and diarrhea. Potentially serious side effects include kidney problems and low platelets. Greater care is recommended for those with poor liver or kidney function.

It is generally considered safe for use in pregnancy with no harm having been observed.

It is safe during breastfeeding.

Should be performed within ≤ 48 hrs of starting [acyclovir](#) (otherwise false negatives may occur).
