

Cranial dermal sinus

Stalk begins with a [dimple](#) in the occipital or nasal region. Cutaneous stigmata of [hemangioma](#), subcutaneous [dermoid cyst](#), or abnormal hair formation may occur. Occipital sinuses extend caudally, and if they enter the skull, they do so caudally to the torcular herophili. The presentation may include recurrent bacterial (usually *S. aureus*) or [aseptic meningitis](#). Evaluation should include MRI to look for the intracranial extension and associated anomalies, including an [intracranial dermoid cyst](#).

Treatment

When operating on a cranial [dermal sinus](#), use a sagittally based incision to permit deep exploration. The tract must be followed completely. Be prepared to enter the [posterior fossa](#).

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
