

In a series of ≈ 10,000 patients followed after [femoral artery catheterization](#)¹⁾ (e.g. for coronary angiography or [angioplasty](#)), [neuropathy](#) occurred in 0.2% (with an estimated range in the literature up to ≈ 3%). Risk factors identified include patients developing [retroperitoneal hematomas](#) or [pseudoaneurysms](#) after the [procedure](#), procedures requiring larger introducer sheaths (e.g. angioplasty & stent placement > diagnostic catheterization), excessive [anticoagulation](#) ([PTT](#) > 90 for at least 12 hours).

[Excruciating pain](#) after the catheterization procedure often preceded the development or recognition of [neuropathy](#).
