

# Fourth ventricle choroid plexus papilloma

In childhood, [choroid plexus papilloma](#) CPPs are usually found in the [lateral ventricles](#) and less commonly in the [posterior fossa](#). On the contrary, in [adults](#), the majority of these [tumors](#) are found in the [fourth ventricle](#) and its [lateral recesses](#)<sup>1)</sup>.

A case of 72-year-old man with posterior fossa lesion operated with provisional diagnosis of metastasis, but turn out to be CPP<sup>2)</sup>.

## Differential diagnosis

Medulloblastoma.

[Atypical teratoid/rhabdoid tumor \(AT/RT\)](#).

Ependymoma.
