Tools and Resources: HCUP provides a suite of tools and resources to facilitate analysis of healthcare data, including HCUPnet, an online query system for accessing HCUP data; the HCUP Data Use Agreement (DUA) system for obtaining restricted data; and software tools for analyzing and visualizing HCUP data.

Research and Publications: HCUP supports a wide range of research projects and publications in areas such as health services research, epidemiology, outcomes research, and healthcare policy analysis. Researchers use HCUP data to study trends in healthcare utilization, healthcare costs, patient outcomes, and disparities in healthcare delivery.
