

Rhinoliquorrhoea

Rhinoliquorrhoea suggests a communication between the [subarachnoid space](#) and the [sinonasal tract](#). Clinical presentation includes clear nasal discharge, [headache](#), [pneumocephalus](#), [meningitis](#) or [brain abscess](#). [Cerebrospinal fluid leaks](#) are mostly of traumatic origin ([skull base fractures](#)), iatrogenic (secondary to [endoscopic endonasal surgery](#)) or associated with tumour aetiology. Occasionally, [hydrocephalus](#) has been the cause of rhinoliquorrhoea in adults, presumably secondary to the chronically [raised intracranial pressure](#) with skull base erosion and meningocele.

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
